Notes from Student Rabbi Joshua

Often thought of as one of the most joyful holidays of the Jewish calendar, Purim is just a few weeks away. It is time to pick out our costumes! And time to make another attempt at making the perfect hamantaschen. It is time to have some fun.

The celebration of Purim centers around four *mitzvot*:

The public reading of the *Megillah*, the Book of Esther

Everyone in the community comes together to hear the story of Esther and Mordechai and how Haman's plot during the times of ancient Persia to destroy the Jewish people was foiled. The reading often includes lots of revelry and silliness. With a special emphasis on making noise whenever Haman's name is mentioned in the story.

Eating a festive holiday meal

Like every Jewish holiday, the food is central. While there are no required foods for the holiday meal, many choose to prepare Persian dishes, or any foods that are "hidden", such as dumplings or keplach. Overall, the *mitzvah* is simply to join friends and family for a festive dinner.

Sending *mishloach manot*

Mishloach manot are gift baskets of at least two prepared foods. The gifts of food are then exchanged with friends. Creating the gift baskets makes for a fun family activity, too!

Giving *Matanot la-eyyonim*

Matanot la-eyyonim are monetary gifts to the poor. These gifts are given so that everyone can afford to celebrate Purim and fulfill the previous three *mitzvot*.

Purim is made up of these four *mitzvot* because together they represent the different relationships we have within our community. We read the *Megillah* as a whole community. We share the festive meal with those closest to us and send *mishloach manot* to friends we might not otherwise see during the holiday. And we give gifts to people in need with whom we may or may not have personal relationships. One who fulfills all four *mitzvot* will have shared a moment of joy with their community as a whole and the individuals that make up the community from their closest loved ones to those they are meeting for the first time. Just as Esther saved all of the Jews of Persia rather than only worry about herself and her family, we celebrate Purim by ensuring that Jewish people everywhere are able to experience this joyous affirmation of Jewish survival.

May you share in all of these mitzvot and share in the joy of the festival of Purim.
